
15 Tons of Maize



15 Tons of maize meal was distributed by the team of young adults who drove all the way from Cape Town (a return road trip of almost 80 hours) to help a small team of local staff and other guests.

New Borehole & Solar Pump Installation at Jabashaba Primary School

Donors to Zimbabwe Outreach nonprofit USA once again came to the aid of another rural school in the village of Jotsholo. After consulting with the local education department, the Jabatshaba Primary school was identified as one of the most needy schools in the district. This school required a new borehole to be drilled, and after a survey was conducted, at the site, it was established that a good supply of underground water was available. After the drilling, a solar-powered system will be installed by Joseph, a local technician. The photos to the right show the delight and gratefulness of the staff.
